Regarding powdermen. Eilteck became an efficient men but he shandoned us for private interests. In the smergency we emplayed a man by the name of Ernest Henry. Then, I restored Berg, who had served in various expedities as well as in pender work. He is reliable, efficient, honost, and has proven the beat junderman at present on the job. Berg is getting \$.65 an hour. I had recommended that he be raised to \$.75. This recommendation went in with Peterson's, Davis', Rumple's, Lincoln's and Jim La Rue's. All recommendations - for some unanown reason - have been ignered; at loast, they have not been acted upon much to the unfairness of the men and to the injury to their confidence in us. It is laxness in astters of this wind that prevents me from getting ablo, skilled curvers to come to Rapid City. It has been noised all over the country that there is no reliability whotever in the Rapid City office of paying their sages.

Again, about the posterion. In our maste we gave Beary \$1.00 per hour, nor did we realize how good a man Berg is. I want now to say that he is a better men than Beary, and that his wage should be lifted to \$...0 and heary should be placed at \$.50 instead of \$1.00.

To have four powdermen of whom Benry and Berry determine the loads under my or Lincoln's rersonal supervision. We have learned in the past weeks that Berg is the safer of the two. Reliability and fafety in blusting for sculpture work are the west important and valuable virtues in a powderman, and, porticularly in the stage that we are now reaching - that is, the finishing of the work. Berg has never misfired, and he is the safest wan that I have for firing any fractions stone.

Biance, as you know, is back, and his presence supposites the frightful handicap this work labors union. Be is the only intelligent, efficient, stone carver on the work the uniorstands the language of the sculpter. I am thinking of going East thertly in hearth of two more men. It will be utterly impossible to carry the much needed finishing of these two heads to anything like perfection with the labor we have been compelled to use.
